## Passive (2) (be/been/being done)

Study the following active and passive forms:

Infinitive

active: (to) do/clean/see etc. Somebody will clean the room later.

(to) be done/cleaned/seen etc. passive:

The room will be cleaned later.

- The situation is serious. Something must be done before it's too late.
- A mystery is something that can't be explained.
- The music was very loud and could be heard from a long way away.
- A new supermarket is going to be built next year.
- Please go away. I want to be left alone.

Perfect infinitive

have done/cleaned/seen etc. active: passive: have been done/cleaned/seen etc. Somebody should have cleaned the room. The room should have been cleaned.

- I haven't received the letter yet. It might have been sent to the wrong address.
- If you hadn't left the car unlocked, it wouldn't have been stolen.
- There were some problems at first but they seem to have been solved.

Present perfect

active: have/has (done) 'have/has been (done) passive:

The room looks nice. Somebody has cleaned it. The room looks nice. It has been cleaned.

- Have you heard the news? The President has been shot!
- Have you ever been bitten by a dog?
- 'Are you going to the party?' 'No, I haven't been invited.'

Past perfect

active: had (done) had been (done) passive:

The room looked nice. Somebody had cleaned it. The room looked nice. It had been cleaned.

- The vegetables didn't taste very good. They had been cooked for too long.
- The car was three years old but hadn't been used very much.

Present continuous

active: am/is/are (do)ing Somebody is cleaning the room at the moment. am/is/are being (done) passive: The room is being cleaned at the moment.

- There's somebody walking behind us. I think we are being followed.
- (in a shop) 'Can I help you, madam?' 'No, thank you. I'm being served.'

Past continuous

active: was/were (do)ing Somebody was cleaning the room when I arrived. passive: was/were being (done) The room was being cleaned when I arrived.

• There was somebody walking behind us. We were being followed.
