Passive 1 (is done / was done)

Study this example:



This house was built in 1935.

Was built is passive.

Compare active and passive:

Somebody built this house in 1935. (active)

This house was built in 1935. (passive)

When we use an active verb, we say what the subject does:

- ☐ My grandfather was a builder. He built this house in 1935.
- ☐ It's a big company. It employs two hundred people.

When we use a passive verb, we say what happens to the subject:

- ☐ This house is quite old. It was built in 1935.
- ☐ Two hundred people are employed by the company.

When we use the passive, who or what causes the action is often unknown or unimportant:

- ☐ A lot of money was stolen in the robbery. (somebody stole it, but we don't know who) ☐ Is this room cleaned every day? (does somebody clean it? – it's not important who)
- If we want to say who does or what causes the action, we use by ...:

☐ This house was built by my grandfather.

- ☐ Two hundred people are employed by the company.

The passive is be (is/was etc.) + past participle (done/cleaned/seen etc.): (be) done (be) cleaned (be) damaged (be) built (be) seen etc.

For irregular past participles (done/seen/known etc.), see Appendix 1.

Study the active and passive forms of the present simple and past simple:

Present simple

active: clean(s) / see(s) etc.

Somebody cleans this room every day.

passive: am/is/are + cleaned/seen etc.

This room is cleaned every day.

Past simple

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active: cleaned/saw etc.

Somebody cleaned this room yesterday. This room was cleaned yesterday.

passive: was/were + cleaned/seen etc.

- □ 'Did you go to the party?' 'No, I wasn't invited.'
- ☐ How much money was stolen in the robbery?

Perfect infinitive active: (to) have + done/cleaned/seen etc. Somebody should have cleaned the room

passive: (to) have been + done/cleaned/seen etc. The room should have been cleaned.

- ☐ If you hadn't left the car unlocked, it wouldn't have been stolen.
- ☐ There were some problems at first, but they seem to have been solved.

Present perfect

active: have/has + done etc.

The room looks nice. Somebody has cleaned it .

passive: have/has been + done etc.

The room looks nice. It has been cleaned.

- ☐ Have you heard? The concert has been cancelled.
- ☐ Have you ever been bitten by a dog?
- ☐ 'Are you going to the party?' 'No, I haven't been invited.'

Past perfect

active: had + done etc.

The room looked nice. Somebody had cleaned it

passive: had been + done etc.

The room looked nice. It had been cleaned.

- ☐ The vegetables didn't taste very good. They had been cooked too long.
- ☐ The car was three years old but hadn't been used very much.

Present continuous

am/is/are + (do)ing

Somebody is cleaning the room at the moment.

am/is/are + being (done)

Passive 3

I was offered ... / we were given ... etc.

Some verbs can have two objects. For example, give: ☐ Somebody gave the police the information. (= Somebody gave the information to the police)

object 2 object 1

So it is possible to make two passive sentences:

☐ The police were given the information. or

The information was given to the police.

Other verbs which can have two objects are:

ask offer pay show teach

When we use these verbs in the passive, most often we begin with the person:

☐ I was offered the job, but I refused it. (= they offered me the job)

☐ You will be given plenty of time to decide. (= we will give you plenty of time)

☐ Have you been shown the new machine? (= has anybody shown you?)

☐ The men were paid £400 to do the work. (= somebody paid the men £400)

I don't like being ...

The passive of doing/seeing etc. is being done / being seen etc. Compare:

active: I don't like people telling me what to do. passive: I don't like being told what to do.

☐ I remember being taken to the zoo when I was a child.

(= I remember somebody taking me to the zoo)

☐ Steve hates being kept waiting. (= he hates people keeping him waiting) ☐ We managed to climb over the wall without being seen. (= without anybody seeing us)

I was born ...

We say 'I was born ...' (not I am born):

☐ I was born in Chicago.

☐ Where were you born? (not Where are you born?)

present ☐ How many babies are born every day?

You can use get instead of be in the passive:

☐ There was a fight at the party, but nobody got hurt. (= nobody was hurt)

☐ I don't often get invited to parties. (= I'm not often invited)

☐ I'm surprised Liz didn't get offered the job. (= Liz wasn't offered the job)

You can use get only when things happen. For example, you cannot use get in the following

☐ Jill is liked by everybody. (not gets liked – this is not a 'happening')

☐ He was a mystery man. Very little was known about him. (not got known)

We use get mainly in informal spoken English. You can use be in all situations.

We also use get in the following expressions (which are not passive in meaning): get lost (= not know where you are) get married, get divorced

get dressed (= put on your clothes)

get changed (= change your clothes)

It is said that ... He is said to ... He is supposed to ...

Study this example situation:



Henry is very old. Nobody knows exactly how old he is,

It is said that he is 108 years old.

He is said to be 108 years old.

Both these sentences mean: 'People say that he is 108 years

You can use these structures with a number of other verbs, especially: alleged believed considered expected known reported thought understood Compare the two structures:

- ☐ Cathy works very hard.
 - It is said that she works 16 hours a day. or
- ☐ The police are looking for a missing boy. It is believed that the boy is wearing a white pullover and blue jeans.
- ☐ The strike started three weeks ago. It is expected that it will end soon.
- ☐ A friend of mine has been arrested. It is alleged that he hit a policeman.
- ☐ The two houses belong to the same family. It is said that there is a secret tunnel
- between them.

These structures are often used in news reports. For example, in a report about an accident: Two people are reported to have

☐ It is reported that two people were injured in the explosion.

- The boy is believed to be wearing a white pullover and blue jeans.
- The strike is expected to end soon.
- He is alleged to have hit a policeman.
- There is said to be a secret tunnel between them.

(Be) supposed to

Sometimes (it is) supposed to ... = (it is) said to ...:

- ☐ I want to see that film. It's supposed to be good. (= it is said to be good)
- ☐ Mark is supposed to have hit a policeman, but I don't believe it.

But sometimes supposed to has a different meaning. We use supposed to to say what is intended, arranged or expected. Often this is different from the real situation:

- ☐ The plan is supposed to be a secret, but everybody seems to know about it.
- (= the plan is intended to be a secret)
- ☐ What are you doing at work? You're supposed to be on holiday. (= you arranged to be on holiday)
- ☐ Our guests were supposed to come at 7.30, but they were late.
- ☐ Jane was supposed to phone me last night, but she didn't. ☐ I'd better hurry. I'm supposed to be meeting Chris in ten minutes.

You're not supposed to do something = it is not allowed or advisable:

- ☐ You're not supposed to park your car here. It's private parking only.
- ☐ Jeff is much better after his illness, but he's still not supposed to do any heavy work.
